Brief Report of the Induction Programme

Day1 began with a Welcome Speech. Mrs. S. Abirami, Asst. Professor, Department of Computer Science welcomed the dignitaries, the presenters of the program, the staff and students and briefed the purpose of the programme. The honourable Secretary Mr. A.N. Henry Maris. welcomed and motivated the gathering.

In the first day a discourse on **Gender Sensitization and Equity was presented by** Mr. E. Gopal, Asst. Professor, Department of Tamil and Dr. A. Saravanan, Asst. Professor, Department of English. It began with the introduction of the Presenters followed by the introduction of the topic.

The programme enabled the students to reflect on their understanding of gender-based concepts and clarified the differences between sex and gender for the students. The presentations helped to increase the comfort level of the students with these issues. They made the student understand the meaning of masculinity or the societal ideas of being a 'real' boy. The students became aware of the different ways to encourage positive behaviours towards building gender-equal relation. The students, especially the boys, were oriented to the Positive role that can be played by them. The programme helped them to understand the role in the society and instilled in them the knowledge and skills necessary for advancing gender equality in their daily lives and work. The aim and objectives of Gender Sensitization was explained. The students understood what Equity stands for. A discussion on discrimination and stereotype enabled the students to understand about ensuring the safety of women and children. The empowerment on Women was insisted to make woman understand their major role in building a nation. The presenters also explained how transgenders are treated and their rights in the society.

The second day's discourse on **Anti-Ragging was presented by** Mrs. B. Devi Mano, Asst. Professor, Department of Computer Application and Mrs. P. Deepa, Asst. Professor, Department of Tamil. It began with the introduction of the Presenters followed by the introduction of the topic.

They explained what constitutes Ragging. They made the students understand the access to the official website for anti-ragging. The discussion helped them to understand how they should get access and educate others for the same. The discourse explained the summary of UGC guidelines against Ragging and the judgement of supreme court The students learnt of the antiaging cell and helpline for anti-ragging procedures inside the college. A music band was arranged by the Senior students and songs against ragging was sung.

SWOT analysis was recommended for the students to analyse about themselves. They were made understand the importance of skill development, career counselling and the necessity of improving student employability skills.

The fourth day's Induction **Topic Social Responsibility was presented by** Ms. M. Angel Monkia, Asst. Professor, Department of B.S.W. and Ms. J. Ierin Benita, Asst. Professor, Department of Commerce. They enabled the students to understand what is Social Responsibility. A video on the same was played. The discussion helped them to understand what is their role as a student, as a friend and as a citizen. They discussed the key points, objectives of the establishment of Unnat Bharat Abhiyan schema. It helped them to understand the responsibility of the students at home, in college, and in the society. They discussed to understand Civic Sense like following Ethics. Insisted that Students should value diversity, defend human rights, advocate for issues, and interact ethically with others. They were made to recognize that everyone has something to contribute so that their approach to relationships will exemplify commitment to develope positive communities.

The last day's **Induction Topic Health** Care was presented by Ms. P. Mathivadhani, Asst. Professor, Department of English and Ms. M.Sivaranjani, Asst. Professor, Department of English.

They enabled the students to understand how health is a very important factor of life. The discussion helped the students to improve knowledge rights and duties in health care as a citizen. Why do we mark International Days?

International days and weeks are occasions to educate the public on issues of concern, to mobilize political will and resources to address global problems, and to celebrate and reinforce achievements of humanity. The existence of international days predates the establishment of the United Nations, but the UN has embraced them as a powerful advocacy tool. We also mark other <u>UN observances</u>.

World Wetlands Day is celebrated every year on 2 February. This day marks the date of the adoption of the Convention on Wetlands on 2 February 1971

Wetlands are ecosystems where water is the primary factor controlling the environment and the associated plant and animal life. A broad definition of wetlands includes both freshwater and marine and coastal ecosystems such as all lakes and rivers, underground aquifers, swamps and marshes, wet grasslands, peatlands, oases, estuaries, deltas and tidal flats, mangroves and other coastal areas, coral reefs, and all human-made sites such as fishponds, rice paddies, reservoirs and saltpans.

These lands are critical to people and nature, given the intrinsic value of these ecosystems, and their benefits and services, including their environmental, climate, ecological, social, economic, scientific, educational, cultural, recreational and aesthetic contributions to sustainable development and human wellbeing.

Though they cover only around 6 per cent of the Earth's land surface, 40 per cent of all plant and animal species live or breed in wetlands. Wetland biodiversity matters for our health, our food supply, for tourism and for jobs. Wetlands are vital for humans, for other ecosystems and for our climate, providing essential ecosystem services such as water regulation, including flood control and water purification. More than a billion people across the world depend on wetlands for their livelihoods — that's about one in eight people on Earth.


Why they are in danger

Wetlands are among the ecosystems with the highest rates of decline, loss and degradation. Indicators of current negative trends in global biodiversity and ecosystem functions are projected to continue in response to direct and indirect drivers such as rapid human population growth, unsustainable production and consumption and associated technological development, as well as the adverse impacts of climate change.

Wetlands are disappearing three times faster than forests and are Earth's most threatened ecosystem. In just 50 years — since 1970 — 35% of the world's wetlands have been lost. Human activities that lead to loss of wetlands include drainage and infilling for agriculture and construction, pollution, overfishing and overexploitation of resources, invasive species and climate change.

This vicious cycle of wetland loss, threatened livelihoods, and deepening poverty is the result of mistakenly seeing wetlands as wastelands rather than lifegiving sources of jobs,

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PREFACE

In pursuance of the Hon'ble Prime Minister Ten Point's Agenda 6, a Network of Universities and institutions has emerged, which was outlined by him before the leaders of the Asian Countries during the Asian Ministerial Conference hosted by the Government of India in the year 2016 in New Delhi. The Agenda 6 of Hon'ble PM's 10 point Agenda stresses developing a network of universities and institutions to work on disaster issues in India. Hence, the National Institute of Disaster Management, Ministry of Home Affairs, and Govt. of India took an initiative of making an India Universities & Institutions Network for Disaster Risk Reduction (IUINDRR-NIDM) for building partnerships with Universities and Institutions in the field of disaster risk reduction.

The Indian Universities and Institutions Network for Disaster Risk Reduction-National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM), India, took the initiative to compile Good Practices of universities and institutions on Agenda 3, "Role of Women in Disaster Risk Management." 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with the intention of risk reduction are referred to as mainstreaming them. Various case studies included in the compendium take us through a journey of various strategies that different educational institutions/universities across the country have applied so far to integrate the components of disaster risk reduction and emergency preparedness to mainstream the role of women in the realm of Disaster Management. The initiatives mainstream the role of women in the Role and Contribution of Higher Educational carried out by IUINDRR-NIDM towards the Role and Contribution of Higher Educational Institutions in Disaster Risk Reduction in India. 
SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITY @ AVADI



NAZARETH COLLEGE ORGANISES WOMEN EMPOWERMENT WORKSHOP





PROJECT 1: Let there be Light Project:


Solar streetlights are raised light sources which are powered by solar panels generally mounted on the lighting structure or integrated into the pole itself. The solar panels charge a rechargeable battery, which powers a LED lamp during the night. The Arikambattu one of the UBA

The few households in the village population lack access to proper sanitation. People must often use open air, unhygienic shared toilets. Based on the survey and the need of the community the UBA team approached Habitat India for Bio Toilets for the community to solve open defecation. Education has been an essential part of the effort too. Bank of America constructed bio toilets to households in Meyyur village.

Investing more, and in a targeted manner, in women can help increase resilience. Planting trees fight climate change and a simple way to soak up

carbon emission. Post pandemic the number of trees has considerably reduced in Avadi because of improper maintenance during covid 19 lockdown. The Nazareth sapling center was initiated in the year 2022 to distribute free saplings to all. SDG 15 aims to protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial eco systems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss.

The Practice:

- 1. To grow saplings form seeds inside the campus
- 2. To collects saplings from the students
- 3. To distribute the saplings to students, faculties and any guests visiting the campus for events.
- 4. To create awareness on the importance of tree conservation through workshop
- 5. To help Avadi Municipal Corporation in covering empty spaces with small dense forests.
- 6. Creating dense forests in small spaces for communities.

Evidence of Success:


- 1. Total of more than 5000 tree saplings grown on campus.

NERF-Feed the Need - Nazareth Community Food Box

Sustainable Development Goal 2 is about creating a world free of hunger by 2030. There are many people





going hungry and suffering from food insecurity. The main objective of this initiative is to serve hot, fresh food to the homeless. This is an initiative involving the students and staff who are trying to help homeless who suffer from hunger. "If you can't feed a hundred people then feed just one" said Mother Theresa, the students and faculty are encouraged to bring food for the Nazareth Community Food Box to feed not one but many. When cooking at home for family the students and faculty are encouraged to cook some extra food that can serve 1 person extra and pack it neatly and deposit in the NCFB. About 1 in 50 people worldwide are suffering from hunger and this small initiative will help vulnerable and homeless people in Avadi Municipal Corporation.

The Practice:

1. To collect fresh home cooked food from students and faculty on every Wednesday







- 2. To distribute the food to the homeless and poor near Avadi
- 3. To distribute the food every Wednesday
- 4. To spread awareness in the neighborhood on wastage of food

Problems Encountered:

- 1. The major problem encountered was that the people who are not homeless demanded the food packets and the students were unable to refuse food.
- 2. The homeless requested non vegetarian food.

Evidence of Success:

This initiative was launched in the year 2019 and has completed a year of feeding the hungry in Avadi Municipal Corporation. More than 2000 food packets have been distributed to the homeless. This initiative has also given us a larger scope to convert it into a community food box at gated communities in Avadi.

Kanmani- Period Poverty











Period poverty affects a minimum of 500 million people every month. For example, of India's 355 million people who menstruate, 12% cannot afford period products. Lack of access to period products can occur due to financial and physical barriers. Prices of period products can put these vital supplies out of reach for many people in both developing and developed countries. People in vulnerable situations are affected most by period poverty, including people already facing homelessness, low income, and systemic exclusion for being members of marginalized groups.

People in developed and developing countries face period poverty due to social and cultural stigmas, misinformation, and gender discrimination around periods. Right now, 800 million people around the world are menstruating, with many trying to hide the evidence of bleeding or struggling to find sanitary supplies. Secrecy, shame, and stigma burden people who menstruate. One pressing issue associated with period poverty is access to education. In India, around 23 million girls drop out of school annually due to the lack of safe and sanitary menstrual hygiene management—including access to products and lack of awareness about menstruation. To decrease period poverty, menstrual products need to be made more affordable and accessible. Menstrual hygiene and education also need to be taken more seriously by governments, decision makers, and educators.

"Kanmani" – low-cost safe sanitary napkin pads manufactured by the Idhu Namma Avadi Trust which employs local women as a project to empower the neighborhood women. The production unit is housed inside the campus of Nazareth College, Kovilpathagai, Avadi and it employs about 8 neighborhood women. The College has taken up a task to bring awareness on mensural hygiene to all the girl students in Avadi. The Pad is made to the Standard Quality as per IS 5405 (1980). Kanmani Awareness is a project that was launched to spread awareness on "Menstrual Hygiene" among the adolescent school children in Avadi city Municipality. The production unit is housed inside the campus of Nazareth College, Kovilpathagai, Avadi and it employs about 8 neighborhood women. The College has taken up a task to bring awareness on mensural hygiene to all the girl





students in Avadi. The Pad is made to the Standard Quality as per IS 5405 (1980). The unit has Cutting, Sterilizing, Sealing and Pressurizing Machines to manufacture the Sanitary Pads. The single women in the community are trained in the manufacturing unit and packaging process



Sustainable practice:

The Kanmani sanitary pad is to be upgraded to biodegradable pads. This will be a positive impact on soil, water, air, forests. Further the affordability of these pads is high as prices are low. As these pads can be buried in a pit it is environmentally

sustainable. These pads also created livelihood option for single women.

Evidence of Success:

- Women students were trained in the college as master trainers on Menstrual Hygiene
- A module on Menstrual hygiene was developed to spread awareness on Menstrual hygiene in the neighboring schools, public places through folk arts (Karagam, Oyilattam and Mime).
- 3. The college established a manufacturing unit to manufacture Biodegradable Sanitary pads Kanmani by employing single women.
- 4. A total of 95 women students are trained to spread awareness on Menstural Hygiene.
- 5. The practice has reached 20000 girl students and 1000 women, 90 tribal women.
